
ith great pool fun comes basic maintenance. The water ph must be balanced, and the pool must be cleared of debris. You'll need to consider automated pool cleaners, which essentially vacuum the water; pool pumps and filters, which circulate and clean the water; chemicals, which are used to keep bacteria out; and pool heaters, which make that morning swim a lovely way to wake up. One note on heating systems: Solar pool heaters allow you to heat the pool without using any additional energy, since they are powered by the sun.





LEFT This pool deck takes on a modern, minimalist aesthetic, with large concrete slabs separated by joints of smooth gray stones. The light color means it won't heat up in the sun, and the stones allow for drainage when it rains.

ABOVE Install your own teak deck, using these 18-inch square panels that snap together with stainless-steel hardware. They can be put on top of almost any material (even crushed stone). Keep in mind that because they're teak, they will age to a weathered gray color.



· designing a path

A path is about more than just getting from one place to another. It's about the journey, which should be as beautiful, fragrant, and full of life as any other part of your garden.

How you approach creating the path depends on how you intend to use it, and who will use it. For example, making it narrow and curvy with bends will slow down traffic, which is a great tool if you have children who you don't want tearing through the area.
